If you still doubt to come to Yekaterinburg, Russia because you think it is a small village somewhere in deep Siberia, where wild people with balalaikas walk along the streets teaming up with even wilder bears, you'd better learn some facts at first. May be you will change your opinion.

Yekaterinburg is a big industrial city with population about 1.500.000 people. It is unofficially named the "third capital" or the "capital of Urals". This is absolutely true as Yekaterinburg dominates the entire Ural region and has the most developed economy. It became the first city in the Soviet Union outside the two capitals to build a subway.

For several years in a row Yekaterinburg has been leading in the national rating of most attractive cities for business by RBC. In 2002, UNESCO recognized the city as one of the 12 ideal cities of the world.

Red is a prominent colour in Russian culture and history. The Russian word for red, 'krasni', was in the past also used to describe something beautiful, good or honourable. Today, it is used mostly to indicate something red in colour. Yet, many important sites and cultural artifacts still reflect the combined usage of the word.

During the Soviet period, red became a part of daily life from an early age. Virtually all children were members of a communist youth group, Pioneers, and were required to wear a red scarf around their necks to school every day.

Many place names in Russia contain the root word for 'red' or 'beautiful'. The most prominent example is Red Square, or 'Krasnaya ploshad', which sits next to the Kremlin. The name of the Square originally comes from the beauty of it and predates the Bolshevik Revolution and communism associated with this colour.

According to a new study published in the journal Proceedings of the National Academy of Sciences, cheetahs are heading toward extinction, and different conservation efforts are needed to protect the species. While acknowledging the difficulty in gathering data because of the cheetah's tendency to travel over vast amounts of territory, the study cites an alarmingly low population estimate of only 7,100 cheetahs remaining worldwide, with most found in six African countries.






